Dear Parents & Carers,

Following the announcement of my successor, Mr Tom Williams has been appointed as the new Headteacher of Bishops, starting in September 2024. We are now planning the period of transition in the summer term where he will meet with key staff to learn as much about the school as possible before September.

The Spring Term has been very busy with lots of successes, the highlight being the amazing production of the musical 'We Will Rock you'. Lots of staff have worked with the Creative Arts team to support our talented students in their performance.







We have made a busy start to 2024 with a variety of trips and experiences for students to enhance learning outside of the classroom including outside speakers coming into school including; A trip to Rockfield Studios in Monmouth, Year 10 students visiting Hereford and Ludlow College to experience careers in catering, a Sixth Form Taster Day for Year 11 students and the Royal Navy visiting Year 8 Technology lessons to run Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths (STEM) activities. The Spring ski trip at half term returned safely with both students and staff all having a great time. Links with Hereford Sixth Form College have been established with the Reach programme where they ate working with some of our students in school.

Year 11 students have been busy planning their revision for the GCSE examinations in the summer term and supported by teaching staff with a variety of after school revision classes. There are also some revision and support sessions organised over the Easter break.

It was wonderful this term, to welcome Year 9 students and parents/carers into school for a face-to-face Options evening. There were lots of positive comments back from parents & carers about the amount of information available and the range of courses we offer to make the important decisions for the March option returns.

We recently had a 'Wear What You Like Day' where donations were taken for the Herefordshire Food Banks. We raised nearly £300 in donations as well as receiving a vast amount of donations of food which was collected on Friday 15th March.

We are very grateful to the Bluecoat Trust who awarded us a successful bid of just under £2000 to support the work of our School Chaplain Mrs Scott in supporting students and developing our Christian characteristics as a Church of England School.

Uniform Expectations

General Uniform

Blazer badge: Gold and blue on maroon background Blazer: Navy blue-plain. Sleeves should not be rolled up.

Pullover V-necked navy blue pullover, may be worn under a blazer, pullovers with motifs should not be worn, and the pullover should not have buttons or emblems of any type.

Tie: Navy with a maroon and gold stripe (or for Y11 maroon and gold striped). The knot should be pulled up to the top of the collar and must be kept smart and tidy. It is acceptable to use a clip on tie.

Shoes: Black (no colour visible on the outside including the sole), smart, safe and sensible (with a heel not exceeding 2 inches). Trainers and canvas shoes should not be worn – shoes should be polishable. There should be no sports brands identified on the outside of the shoe. Boots are not acceptable.

Hair

Hair should be neat and tidy and not be of an extreme fashion in style and colour. If colour is applied to hair, then it should conform to natural hair colours and should be one colour. Students with long hair should tie it back during particular lessons for safety reasons. All beards should be trimmed and neat in appearance. Hair will be cut no shorter than a grade four.

Jewellery

Only one small pair of gold or silver earrings of the stud kind can be worn in the lower lobe of either ear. This means that rings, bracelets, necklaces and any other facial piercings are not allowed. This includes piercings on any other part of the ear, nose, lip, tongue or eyebrow. There should be no visible use of make-up. Nails should be natural in colour with no nail varnish. False nails or acrylics are not allowed, there are no exceptions to this. Only badges provided by the school can be worn with the exception of poppies for remembrance.

Uniform Expectations

Girls

Skirt/Trousers: Regulation tartan knee length 20" skirt, or navy trousers conforming to school design – any alternatives are not acceptable (regulation school skirts are available from the school shop). Skirts should not be rolled up. The bottom of the skirt should be as close to the top of the knee as possible.

Blouse: Pale blue, worn tucked in at the waist. The top button should be done up, so please make sure that the neck size is appropriate.

Socks: Dark socks (ankle or knee length) or tights. No coloured patterns visible when shoes are worn and no trainer socks.

Boys

Trousers: Black or dark grey (smart, not casual – not jeans, cords, denims)

Shirt: Pale blue, worn tucked in at the waist. The top button should be done up, so please make sure that the neck size is appropriate.

Socks: Dark socks. No coloured patterns visible when shoes are worn.

Warm coats and scarves can be worn outside at break and lunch but should not be worn inside the buildings.

Hoodies cannot be worn on the school site.

Tailored unisex shorts are also available which have the school logo. No other designs will be acceptable.






Year 11 modelling properties of alpha, beta and gamma radiation. Wonderful work by Maddie.



Year 11 Exam advice - Graphs

When asked to describe what is shown in a graph ensure that:

- 1) the quantity in the question is referred to (y axis shows volume, and the question asks about density!)
- 2) data is used and
- 3) that the shape is described.



Describe how the density of water changes with temperature over the range of temperature shown in Figure 6.

Model answer:

As the temperature increases from 0° C to 4° C the volume decreases so the density increases.

The graph is non-linear.







Year 7 History


















Year 8 History

Following a unit of work on Empire and slavery students have explored the life of enslaved people and produced a resource booklet aimed at helping younger students understand the life of the enslaved.

















Digimap for Schools








Year 11 Reflective Revision




Welcome to the Languages **Department at Bishop's!**




On 7th March, the Languages Department joined with Mrs Chappell in the library and presented a quiz for our year 7 and 8 students to do. They had a list of Roald Dahl book titles and had to find a picture in the library of the corresponding book cover, but for the French translation of the book. When book titles are translated to French or any other language, the title after translation might not mean exactly the same as the original. Titles are chosen for various reasons, sometimes impact, sometimes they are a play on words or a rhyme etc. Therefore, just translating the words exactly into the other language might not make a great book title (this works for songs and film titles too). The skill of translation is getting the meaning of the book translated into the other language, without losing the essence of the book. Translating poetry is a particular skill, as there are often a lot of elements involved in the poem, not just the words themselves.









Languages



On Wednesday 31st January, we had a visit from Steve Eadon, founder of Mingalaba, to give a motivational talk to all of your Year 9 students on the value of learning languages.

Steve started the talk by sharing his personal journey with languages – from being a disengaged pupil to working for one of the world's biggest professional football clubs (Arsenal). He was the manager of the award-wining

'Arsenal Double Club' modern languages project, which used Arsenal and football to inspire young people to learn a language. He also shared numerous anecdotes with the students about Arsenal footballers and their language skills.

Steve then moved onto giving students an insight about the range of career options available to them in football, where language skills would be hugely valuable. Throughout his talk, he stressed the importance of studying languages at GCSE and beyond as a way to widen your career prospects in any field.

Two weeks ago Mrs Metcalfe's Year 7 Class received a second big envelope from their letter exchange school in Pont D'Ain near Lyon in France. We have been sharing the letters out in class and reading what the French students have written in English. It is interesting to see that French students are learning similar topics to those on our Key Stage 3 curriculum.

The French school has just had a week's holiday, which is called 'Spring Break', so they will not be having another two weeks at Easter, as we do. 
It is so amazing to see how much more detail our students were able to include in their letters this time – the progress is there for all to see!
